



Notre Dame Sports' News TRANSFER RULE UPDATE

The NYSPHSAA has made a change in the wording of its transfer rule to benefit student-athletes who are not competing for League or Sectional titles. Beginning with the Fall of 2019, transfer students who do not have a corresponding change of address can play **Sub-Varsity (JV or Mod)** even if they played JV or Varsity at their previous school prior to transfer to Notre Dame. *They still cannot play Varsity for one year*. New Wording from NYSPHSAA handbook:

NOTE: Students in grades 7-10, shall be eligible to participate at the sub-varsity level and practice at all levels, while students in grades 11-12 shall be limited to practice (all levels) only. (July 2019). At no time during the one-year period of ineligibility at the varsity level should a student participate in a scrimmage or be an exhibition participant.

CONCUSSION MANAGEMENT

NOTRE DAME HS CONCUSSION MANAGEMENT GUIDELINES AND PROCEDURES

Education

Concussion education is provided for all physical education teachers, coaches, school nurses and athletic trainers. Education of parents should be accomplished through preseason meetings for sports and/ or information sheets provided to parents {see www.ndhsbatavia.com for NYSED Pamphlet on Concussions}. Education should include, but not be limited to, the definition of concussion, signs and symptoms of concussion, how concussions may occur, why concussions are not detected with CT Scans or MRI's, management of the injury and the protocol for return to school and return to activity or interscholastic athletics. The protocols will cover all students returning to school after suffering a concussion regardless if the accident occurred outside of school or while participating in a school activity.

IMPACT Baseline Testing:

Notre Dame uses the IMPACT test to establish baselines for all students to be used in concussion management and return to play protocols. Students returning from concussion are retested and the new scores compared to their baseline. The results are used to help determine if they are ready to return.

Return to Play Protocol following a concussion:

The following protocol has been established in accordance to the National Federation of State High School Associations and NYSPHSAA for concussion management:

When an athlete shows **ANY** signs or symptoms of a concussion:

- 1. The athlete will not be allowed to return to play in the current game or practice.
- 2. The athlete should not be left alone, and regular monitoring for deterioration is essential over the initial few hours following injury.
- 3. The athlete should be medically evaluated following the injury.
- 4. Return to play must follow a medically supervised stepwise process.

The cornerstone of proper concussion management is rest until all symptoms resolve and then a graded program of exertion before return to sport. The program is broken down into six steps in **which only one step is covered a day.** The six steps involve the following:

- 1. No exertional activity until asymptomatic for 24 hours.
- 2. Light aerobic exercise such as walking or stationary bike, etc. No resistance training.
- 3. Sport specific exercise such as skating, running, etc. Progressive addition of resistance training may begin.
- 4. Non-contact training/skill drills.
- 5. Full contact training in practice setting.
- 6. Return to play.

If any concussion symptoms recur, the athlete should drop back to the previous level and try to progress after 24 hours of rest. The student-athlete should also be monitored for recurrence of symptoms due to mental exertion, such as reading, working on a computer, or taking a test.

NOTRE DAME INSTITUTES MORE STRINGENT SPORTSMANSHIP POLICY

ND's athletic department has instituted a more stringent policy regarding game Disqualifications and Unsportsmanlike penalties. Starting this Fall, any athlete (or coach) that is disqualified from a contest will sit out the Section & NYSPHSAA mandated game as well as an additional game tacked on by ND. Also any athlete assessed an Unsportsmanlike Conduct Penalty will be removed from the game for one quarter. The only exceptions are in football; they will sit an additional half, not an entire game due to the number of contests (7) in relationship to other sports (16 to 20), and Soccer will sit 8 minutes on Unsportsmanlike Penalties since they play halves. These exceptions are to be fair to all athletes. There is an appeal process which begins by contacting the Athletic Office



The purpose of this change is to motivate our athletes to conduct themselves in a manner that reflects positively on them, their families, and our school. We have seen an alarming increase in the number of disqualifications and hope this motivates our student-athletes (and coaches) to keep their emotions in check as well as conduct themselves in a more Sportsmanlike manner.

College Application Timeline: 12th Grade

(College Board Recommendations)

Fall 2019

• Narrow your list of colleges to between five and 10. Meet with your Adviser (Mrs. Calarco-Gomez) about your college choices, and if you haven't done so yet, download college applications and financial aid forms. Plan to visit as many of these colleges as possible.



- Create a master list or calendar that includes:
- o Tests you'll take and their fees, dates, and registration deadlines
- College application due dates
- Required financial aid application forms and their deadlines (aid applications may be due before college applications)
- Other materials you'll need (recommendations, transcripts, etc.)
- Your high school's application processing deadlines
- Ask your Adviser to help you request a fee waiver if you can't afford application or test fees.
- <u>Take the SAT® one more time</u>: Many seniors retake the SAT in the fall. Additional course work since your last test could help you boost your performance. Plus, you already know what to expect on test day.
- **Be sure** to have your SAT scores sent to the colleges you're applying to.
- <u>Complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA):</u> To apply for most financial aid, you'll need to complete the FAFSA. Oct. 1 is the first day you can file the FAFSA.
- Prepare early decision/early action or rolling admission applications as soon as possible. Colleges may require test scores and applications between Nov. 1 and Nov. 15 for early decision admission.
- Ask a counselor or teacher for recommendations if you need them. Give each teacher or counselor an outline of your academic record and your extracurricular activities. For each recommendation, provide a stamped, addressed envelope and any college forms required.
- Write first drafts and ask teachers and others to read them if you're submitting essays. If you're applying for early decision, finish the essays for that application now.
- Complete all college applications by Thanksgiving.
- <u>Complete the transcript request form for you Adviser</u> to send your transcripts to colleges. Give your Adviser the proper forms at least two weeks before the colleges require them.

Winter 2019/2020

- **<u>Keep photocopies</u>** as you finish and send your applications and essays.
- <u>Have your high school send a transcript</u> it is sent separately by mail to colleges if you apply online to colleges.
- Give the correct form to your Adviser if the college wants to see second-semester grades.



Spring 2020

Keep active in school. If you are wait listed, the college will want to know what you have accomplished between the time you applied and the time you learned of its decision.

<u>Visit your final college before accepting</u>. You should receive acceptance letters and financial aid offers by mid-April. Notify your counselor of your choice. If you have questions about housing offers, talk to your admissions counselor or call the college.

Inform every college of your acceptance or rejection of the offer of admission and/or financial aid by May 1. Colleges cannot require your deposit or your commitment to attend before May 1. Talk to your

counselor or adviser if you have questions.

- <u>Send your deposit</u> to one college only.
- <u>Take any AP® Exams</u>. Show what you've learned in your AP classes. A successful score could even earn you credit, advanced placement, or both, in college.
- Waitlisted by a college? If you intend to enroll if you are accepted, tell the admission director your intent and ask how to strengthen your application. Need financial aid? Ask whether funds will be available if you're accepted.
- Work with an Admissions Counselor to resolve any admission or financial aid problems.
- Ask Advisement Office to send a final transcript to your college.
- Review your financial aid awards: Not all financial aid awards are the same, so it's important to choose the aid package that's best for you and your family. Be sure to note what you have to do to continue receiving financial aid from year to year, and how your aid might change in future years.
